No More is based on a memory of things, my interpretation of what resides in memory.

Broadcast on the BBC in August 1971, The Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, Brian Faulkner, makes an announcement introducing Internment without trial. My 5th birthday was just five days before and although I can't be sure I was watching TV that evening I know I could have been. The next day my father was gone. This piece, in a sense, is based on that trauma.

No More uses this TV material alongside footage of Ryszard Cieślak, lead actor from Jerzy Grotowski's Polish Laboratory Theater Company to conjure a memory of things past. The sounds are those that resonate from memory but are not always directly related to it. Cieślak, the dancer, demonstrates body exercises (derived from Hatha Yoga) designed to allow the practitioner to go beyond 'their own personal limitations'. The associated, constructed soundscape connects his movements to a space of 'the haunting' and a new memory is created.



The two filmed events, which took place at the same time in two different parts of Europe, come together some 40 years later to open up a connected world within memory.
